# I. FOOD AND BEVERAGE SECTOR

# → Tripartite meeting with KRA and Weights & Measures Directorate



# **Engagement Details**

Micro-craft distilleries (MCDs) under KAM convened a tripartite meeting with the Kenya Revenue Authority (KRA) and the Department of Weights and Measures. The meeting aimed to follow up on the proposed alternative framework for regulating MCDs, presented during a public participation forum on the Finance Bill 2024.

### **Outcome**

- I. A joint visit to Yamaroku Ltd in Koru is scheduled for 11th 12th July 2024, to inspect their manufacturing process.
- 2. Regulators will compile a report on findings from visits to MCDs, along with recommendations for the way forward.

# →KAM Sugar Millers Subsector meeting



# **Engagement Details**

On 20th June 2024, sugar millers who are members of KAM convened to appoint a new chairperson, address sector challenges, and coordinate on necessary interventions where support from the KAM Secretariat is needed.

### **Outcome**

- I.KAM intends to engage the AFA-Sugar Directorate to present the industry's position on interventions addressing challenges facing the sector.
- 2. Frederick Coombes from Transmara Sugar was elected as the new chair for the KAM Sugar Millers Subsector.

# →Sector meeting on EAS 38 - Standard on labelling of pre-packaged foods



### **Engagement Details**

On 25th June 2024, KAM convened a meeting to discuss a proposal to amend the standard for labeling pre-packaged foods (EAS 38). The proposal aims to change the mandatory requirement for including the date of manufacture to an optional one, aligning it with CXS STAN I. This adjustment is intended to mitigate potential non-tariff barriers (NTBs) that could arise from differing labeling requirements.

### **Outcome**

- I.Members will be given additional time to review the proposal within their organizations. Following this review period, a follow-up meeting will be scheduled to reach a final consensus.
- 2. Members are encouraged to propose any additional amendments to EAS 38 that they wish to have considered.

# → Finance Bill and EAC gazette advocacy engagements

# EAST AFRICAN COMMUNITY EAC COMMON EXTERNAL TARIFF

# **Engagement Details**

**Finance Bill 2024:** The President declined to assent to the Finance Bill 2024. Consequently, proposed taxes on essential products such as cooking oil and bread do not apply.

**EAC Gazette:** The EAC Gazette was published and circulated on June 30th, 2024. Notably, import duties, including those on crude palm oil, have been introduced.

### **Outcome**

KAM to analyze the impact of the two updates and circulate to members for noting and prepare an advocacy plan for the sector.

# 2. AUTOMOTIVE SECTOR

# →2nd EAC Automotive Sector Platform meeting



# **Engagement details**

The EAC Partner States held the 2nd EAC Automotive Sector Platform from 29th - 30th June 2024. During the meeting, the following aspects were discussed:

- I. Harmonization of vehicle age limits
- 2. Study on low-cost/affordable vehicles
- 3. Exchange visit to Germany
- 4. Harmonization of policies within EAC
- 5. Assembly Regulations
- 6. Establishment of an Automotive Industrial and Technology Park
- 7. Establishment of a motor vehicle skills program

### **Outcome**

The EAC Secretariat will convene a meeting by September 2024 to address the following:

- I. Data availability for the sector
- 2. Issues affecting the sector as highlighted in the June 2024 EAC Gazette Notice
- 3. Proposals regarding vehicle age limits
- 4. Development of an incentive framework
- 5. E-Mobility initiatives

# →E-mobility incentives for the sector



# **Engagement Details**

On 11th June 2024, the Automotive Sector met to review various proposals for e-mobility incentives. These proposals cover bicycles, motorcycles, and motor vehicles, and focus on:

- **LVAT**
- 2. Excise duty
- 3. Import duty
- 4. Tax-free importation of 100,000 EV units into the country

# **Outcome**

The meeting agreed upon and approved various e-mobility incentives for submission to the government for consideration.

# → Finance Bill 2024 and the 30th June EAC Gazette



# **Engagement Details**

**Finance Bill 2024:** The Finance Bill 2024 was not assented to by the President and as such, taxation of automotive products remains as per Finance Act 2023 on domestic taxes.

**EAC Gazette**: The EAC gazette was published and circulated on 30th June 2024. Kenya has once again stayed to apply import duty of 35% on all motor vehicles of tariff headings 8702, 8703 and 8704, currently attracting CET rate of 25%.

### **Outcome**

A detailed presentation will be given during the meeting scheduled for 10th July 2024. We encourage all sector members to attend and participate.

# 3. LEATHER & FOOTWEAR SECTOR

# → Leather & Footwear Sector engages with KenInvest



# **Engagement Details**

On 13th June 2024, the Leather and Footwear Sector participated in a leather forum organized by Kenlnvest. The forum aimed to bring together stakeholders from various sectors to discuss and strategize ways to improve the leather and leather products value chain in Kenya. The KAM Leather and Footwear Sector, represented by its Vice Chair Robert Njoka, delivered a presentation on innovation and technology in leather processing.

### **Outcome**

KenInvest will collaborate with relevant stakeholders, including government agencies, to implement some of the proposed recommendations.

# → Leather & Footwear Roundtable on Export Levy on Raw Hides and Skin



# **Engagement Details**

On 25th June 2024, the Leather & Footwear Sector participated in a roundtable discussion on export levies on raw hides and skins and the competitiveness of Kenyan leather, organized by KIPPRA. The discussions provided stakeholders with an opportunity to share insights on how export levies impact the competitiveness of Kenyan leather products. These insights will contribute to a research paper that will guide future policy decisions related to the leather sector.

# **Outcome**

KAM to share detailed feedback on the research paper.

# → Finance Bill 2024 and the 30th June EAC Gazette



# **Engagement Details**

**EAC Gazette Notice:** Kenya has been granted a one-year stay on the application of the EAC CET rate of 25%, allowing the country to apply a duty rate of 35% for items under tariff heading 4202. Additionally, Kenya has received DRS approvals for raw materials, inputs, and equipment used in the manufacture of footwear/shoes under various HS Codes.

**Finance Bill 2024:** The President declined to assent to the Finance Bill, that had proposed to subject leather articles under Chapter 42 and imported footwear under Chapter 64 to the Export and Import Levy (EIPL) at 20% of the customs value.

### **Outcome**

KAM will compile a summary of the EAC Gazette Notice and distribute it to members during the Q2 Sector meeting.

# 5. TEXTILES & APPARELS SECTOR

# → Elections for Local Textiles & Apparel Sub-Sector leadership



# **Engagement Details**

On 12th June 2024, the Local Textiles and Apparel Sub-Sector held elections. Mr. Jayesh Shah was elected as the Sector Chair, with Mr. Pravin Shah and Mr. Sagar Shah chosen as Vice Chairs.

# **Outcome**

The new leadership will meet with the KAM Secretariat in July to schedule a comprehensive meeting for the entire Local Textiles & Apparel Sector.

# → Textiles & Apparel Sector Engages KenInvest



# **Engagement Details**

On 13th June 2024, the Textiles & Apparel Sector participated in a forum organized by Kenlnvest. The event gathered industry stakeholders to discuss challenges, opportunities, share best practices, foster collaborations, and develop strategies to enhance Kenya's textile and apparel sector.

### Outcome

KenInvest will work with pertinent stakeholders, including government agencies, to implement some of the recommendations.

# → Local Textiles & Apparel Sector Engagement on EPR



# **Engagement Details**

The Local Textiles and Apparel Sector held meetings with Uptex EA on 11th June 2024, and with DI East Africa and the Best Seller Foundation on 12th June 2024. The purpose of these meetings was to explore solutions for managing industrial and post-industrial waste in compliance with Sustainable Waste Management Act 2022, which requires the sector to establish a Producer Responsibility Organization (PRO) to address environmental pollution caused by textiles and apparel.

### **Outcome**

KAM will prepare data on waste generated by manufacturers using the HS Code approach.

# → Local Textiles & Apparel Sector Engagement on EPR



# **Engagement Details**

Under the EAC Gazette, Kenya was granted a one-year duty remission on raw materials and inputs for the manufacture of garments and other textile made-up products, covering 18 tariff codes. Additionally, Kenya received a Stay of Application on the CET Rate, allowing the country to apply a duty rate of 25% or a specific duty of USD 0.75 per kg, whichever is higher, for various tariff codes.

# Outcome

KAM will compile data on waste generated by manufacturers using the HS Code methodology.



# 5. PAPER AND PAPER BOARD SECTOR

# → Q2 Sector meeting



# **Engagement Details**

On 25th June 2024, the Paper Sector held its Q2 meeting. The subsectors presented their business performance and drafted key action points.

### **Outcome**

Subsector leaders will collaborate with members to undertake specific advocacy on key issues affecting their businesses, including engagements with:

- I.KEBS Tissue Subsector
- 2. KEWOPA and PS Gender Diapers and Sanitary Towels Subsector
- 3.PS Industry Bags, Sacks, and Corrugators Subsector

# → Media engagement for the paper sector



# **Engagement Details**

Bags and sacks manufacturers conducted various media engagements to highlight the impact of taxes on Kenya's paper sector, specifically leading to the closure of sections of bags and sacks manufacturing.

The aim of these engagements was to advocate for the removal of the Export and Investment Promotion Levy (EIPL) on kraft paper and kraftliner.

### **Outcome**

The Finance Bill 2024 had proposed the removal of the EIPL on paper. However, with the withdrawal of the Bill, the levy will remain in effect in accordance with the Finance Act 2023.

# → Emerging issues on Finance Bill and EAC Gazette



### Tax Head

**Finance Bill 2024:** The Finance Bill 2024 was not assented to by the President. Therefore, the taxation of paper products remains governed by the Finance Act 2023, including the Export and Investment Promotion Levy (EIPL).

**EAC Gazette:** The EAC Gazette was published and circulated on 30th June 2024. Paper products have been granted a stay of application, allowing a 35% import duty to remain in effect.

### **Outcome**

KAM to analyze the impact and circulate to members for noting and prepare advocacy plan for the sector.

# **Upcoming Activities:**

- 1.On 12th July 2024, a dissemination workshop will be held to present the paper verification results to all sector players. All sector players, including paper millers, corrugators, and manufacturers of sacks and bags, are invited to attend. Further details will be shared with members.
- 2. Meeting to discuss impact of the EAC Gazette on the sector to be held once date is agreed upon within the month of July.

# 6. CHEMICAL & ALLIED SECTOR

# → Sensitization on Hazardous Waste Producer Responsibility of Kenya (HAPROK)



# **Engagement Details**

On 19th June 2024, KAM conducted a member sensitization session on the extended producer responsibility for the Chemical Sector. Members were specifically informed about the role of the Hazardous Waste Producer Responsibility of Kenya (HAPROK).

### **Outcome**

Members were informed on the need to join such platforms and the legal provisions that anchor the extended producer responsibility.

# → Emerging Issues on Finance Bill and EAC Gazette



### Tax Head

**Finance Bill 2024:** The Finance Bill 2024 was not assented to by the President. Therefore, taxation of paper products, including excise duty on resins, remains governed by the Finance Act 2023.

**EAC Gazette:** The EAC Gazette was published and circulated on June 30th, 2024, affecting products such as inputs for the manufacture of mosquito repellants.

### **Outcome**

KAM will analyze the impact, circulate it to members for their attention, and prepare an advocacy plan for the sector.

# → Trade and Tax Committee arbitration on soap nodules



# **Engagement Details**

The KAM Trade and Tax Committee (TTC) convened to discuss the import duty on soap nodules used in cosmetics production. Cosmetic manufacturers sought duty remission to reduce manufacturing costs, a proposal opposed by soap nodule manufacturers.

### **Outcome**

The TTC reviewed submissions from both parties and observed that soap nodules are locally produced in adequate quantities as an intermediate product. Therefore, they should be subject to a duty rate of 25%, aligning with the third band of the EAC CET for intermediate goods.

# 7. METAL AND ALLIED SECTOR

# → Report on joint industry verification visit to Heavy Engineering Ltd

# **Engagement Details**

### **Outcome**



In June 2024, KAM, KEBS, KRA, National The National DRS Committee adopted the industry verification report for Heavy Engineering Limited, conducted on 19th April 2024. The report documented the team's findings and recommendations, which will be presented for consideration during the Duty Remission Committee meeting.

Treasury, MITI, and MEACA completed a joint verification report and approved the recommendations outlined therein.

# Outcome




On 6th June 2024, the KAM Metal and Allied Sector participated in a meeting with Rebecca Miano, EGH, Cabinet Secretary for the Ministry of Investment, Trade, and Industry (MITI) to discuss the implications of proposed taxes in the Finance Bill 2024. These include proposals affecting the Steel Sector, such as the Export and Investment Promotion Levy (EIPL), IDF, and others.

The Ministry to align to what the manufacturing sector had proposed.

# → Emerging issues on EAC Gazette

# **Engagement Details**

### **Outcome**



**EAC Gazette:** The EAC Gazette published and circulated on 30th June 2024, impacts various products, including extended stays on finished aluminum products, wire products, angles, sections, and LPG cylinders, among others.

KAM will assess the impact, share the findings with members for consideration, and develop an advocacy plan for the sector.

# 8. TIMBER AND FURNITURE SECTOR

# → KAM engages CS Environment, Forestry and Climate Change



# **Engagement Details**

On 13th June 2024, KAM engaged the CS Ministry of Environment, Forestry and Climate Change, Soipan Tuya on the Manufacturing Priority Agenda, 2024. Key issues discussed included government support towards commercial forestry. The meeting was attended by KAM leadership and the Timber Sector Chairperson.

### **Outcome**

- I.The CS suggested scheduling a follow-up meeting with the Timber Sector to address sector-specific issues like green fiscal incentives and tree planting initiatives.
- 2. Details regarding the meeting will be communicated once a date is confirmed by the CS.

# → Trade and Tax Committee arbitration on MDF and Particle Boards



# **Engagement Details**

The KAM Trade and Tax Committee (TTC) met to discuss the import duty on MDF and Particle Boards. Furniture manufacturers proposed removing the 35% duty on these materials, which was opposed by board manufacturers. After reviewing submissions from both parties, the TTC concluded that MDF and particle boards are intermediate products, aligning them with the EAC CET 3rd band classification.

# **Outcome**

The TTC recommended reclassifying MDF and particle boards under the EAC CET 4-band structure, specifically placing them in the third band with a 25% duty rate. Additionally, the Committee proposed allowing manufacturers of door skins using boards narrower than 5mm to apply for duty remission if the reclassification does not proceed.

# → Emerging Issues on Finance Bill 2024 and EAC Gazette



### Tax Head

**Finance Bill 2024:** The Finance Bill 2024 was not assented to by the President, thus maintaining the taxation of paper products under the Finance Act 2023, including Excise Duty on laminates.

**EAC Gazette:** Regarding the EAC Gazette published on 30th June 2024, it stated that certain products such as MDF and particle boards will continue to be subjected to a specific duty rate of 35%.

### **Outcome**

KAM will assess the impact, share findings with members for review, and develop an advocacy plan for the sector.

# 9. BUILDING, MINING AND CONSTRUCTION SECTOR

### → Cement Sub-Sector Elections



# **Engagement Details**

On 6th June 2024, the KAM Cement Sub-Sector held an election for the sub-sector leadership. This came after the serving term of the existing leadership came to an end and as per the KAM governance structure, the new leadership should be put in place.

### Outcome

- 1.Incoming Leadership:
  - a. Cement Sub-sector Chair elected Mr. Mohit Kapoor.
  - b. Cement Sub-sector Vice Chair elected Mr. Lokesh Kumar.

# → KAM Engagement with CS Environment



# **Engagement Details**

On 13th June 2024, the KAM Building, Mining and Construction Sector engaged the Cabinet Secretary for Environment, Climate Change and Forestry, Soipan Tuya to discuss the impact of the proposed taxes in the Finance Bill 2024. Among the proposals discussed are the excise duty on coal and the eco levy on plastic packaging materials.

### **Outcome**

- I.KAM proposed:
  - a. The imposition of eco levy on imported finished plastic packaging materials, and,
  - b. The removal of the proposed excise duty on coal.

# → Emerging Issues on EAC Gazette



# **Engagement Details**

**EAC Gazette:** The EAC Gazette was published and circulated on 30th June 2024. Certain products, such as ceramic tiles and window putty, will maintain a duty rate of 35%. Additionally, the Sector celebrated a new victory: the reinstatement of duty remission for inputs used in manufacturing stone-coated roofing tiles.

### **Outcome**

KAM will analyze the impact, share the findings with members for review, and develop an advocacy plan for the sector.

# **10. PLASTIC AND RUBBER SECTOR**

# → Plastics & Rubber Sector meets CS Environment on Finance Bill 2024

# **Engagement Details**

On 13th June 2024, the Plastics and Rubber Sector met with Hon. Soipan Tuya, Cabinet Secretary of the Ministry of Environment, Climate Change, and Forestry. The meeting discussed objections to the eco levy in the Finance Bill 2024, citing concerns about double taxation with the Extended Producer Responsibility under the Sustainable Waste Management Act, 2022. The Sector also proposed applying the eco levy to imported finished plastics packaging materials and reintroducing VAT exemptions for recycling plant and machinery.

### **Outcome**

The Cabinet Secretary committed to supporting EPR schemes, accelerating regulatory finalization, and collaborating with manufacturers on sustainability initiatives to mitigate climate change impacts.

# → KEBS convenes Plastics Technical Committee on home compostable standards



# **Engagement Details**

On 13th June 2024, KEBS convened the Plastics Technical Committee (TC 50) meeting to discuss draft compostable standards aimed at guiding the transition from plastic to non-plastic bags for waste collection.

# **Outcome**

The draft CD-CHEM135:2024 Home Compostable Standards integrated feedback from members. KEBS plans to hold a follow-up meeting in July to finalize the standards.

# → PET sub-sector meeting to discuss on media strategy



# **Engagement Details**

On 19th June 2024, the PET Sub-sector convened to develop a media strategy. The strategy aims to highlight local, regional, and global policies influencing the PET industry, as well as private sector achievements in sustainable plastics management in Kenya.

### **Outcome**

KAM to review and guide on the development of a media strategy for PET.

# **II. SALT SUB-SECTOR**

→ Salt Sub-sector holds a dispute resolution meeting for Krystalline Salt land

# **Engagement Details**

On 5th June 2024, the salt sub-sector conducted an Alternative Dispute Resolution meeting at the sector liaison office to address the land conflict between Krystalline Salt Ltd and Johnson Panja Kilifi. Attendees included parents of students sponsored by the company and local opinion leaders. The meeting acknowledged the company's use of alternative dispute resolution methods in resolving Mr. Panja's land dispute.

### **Outcome**

It was agreed that the company will resume bursary payments only upon the resolution of the malicious damage to its property. Additionally, there was consensus that the police should play a more proactive role in investigating and ensuring suspects are brought to justice in court.

→ Salt sub sector members visit to Kensalt Company



# **Engagement Details**

On 6th June 2024, the salt sub-sector officers conducted a membership visit to Kensalt Company Ltd. During the meeting with the Company General Manager, they discussed areas needing support, including community engagement forums at the new company site in Kanagoni, meetings with local political leaders, and boundary identification and marking for the Kanagoni site.

### **Outcome**

The meeting scheduled community forums within the company's catchment area, along with planned environmental compliance initiatives to be implemented.

→Salt sub-sector holds a community engagement forum at Kanagoni



# **Engagement Details**

On 12th June 2024, the Salt sub sector held a community engagement forum at Kurawa Kanagoni Primary school. The forum created awareness to the community on land laws and the requirement for company boundary identification and marking. The forum was Chaired by Magarini Deputy County Commissioner, Peter Thiong'o and attended by various government agencies dealing with land matters.

# Outcome

The Community requested the land surveyor to show the area maps to help clear any doubt on land ownership. Similarly, the meeting agreed for a follow up forum where area leaders and opinion leaders will forge a way forward on the boundary marking process.



# II. SALT SUB-SECTOR

# → Salt Sub-sector participates in Small Claims Court Users' Sensitization Forum

# **Engagement Details**

# **Outcome**



On 14th June 2024, members of the salt subsector attended and participated in the Coastal Region Small Claims Court Users' Sensitization Forum held in Malindi. The training gathered various business organizations and private sector groups to raise awareness about the operations of the small claims court and promote its utilization.

The participants agreed to utilize the services of the small claims court to reduce the number of pending cases in the mainstream court, thereby addressing delays in rulings.

On 21st June 2024, sector officers, along with the Krystalline Salt Zone Manager, the Magarini DCC, and Marereni Council of Elders, engaged with Muyu Wa Kae squatters. After identifying and marking the boundaries of the company's Marereni land, 71 squatters were identified. The forum then worked with the squatters in the Muyu Wa Kae area to prepare them for vacating the land to accommodate the company's expansion plans.

The squatters requested some time to internally consult with family members and prepare a proposal to present to the company for consideration.

# **Engagement Details**

### Outcome



On 24th June 2024, members of the Salt Sub-sector held their second quarter sector meeting virtually. All sector members, along with two legal consultants, attended the meeting. Discussions included sector administrative and policy issues, including the renewal of the KAM/Salt Sub-sector service agreement.

- 1. The meeting received updates on sector court cases, including legal advice on challenges related to the Mining Act, 2016.
- 2. Members also reached a consensus on several review areas within the KAM sector service agreement.

### **Upcoming Activities:**

- 1. Salt Subsector meeting with Kilifi County revenue enforcement team, confirmed dates will be communicated.
- 2. Boundary identification and marking for Kensalt Kanagoni area scheduled for July 2024.

# → KAM and MITI visit Sun King to discuss incentives for electronics assemblers



# **Engagement Details**

On 12th June 2024, KAM and MITI collaborated to review the electronics regulatory framework in Kenya and discuss fiscal incentives for mobile phone and television assemblers. KAM confirmed duty remission for mobile phone assemblers.

### Outcome

MITI agreed to fast track the finalization of developed draft Electronics Regulations and recommend Sun King to be recognized as electronics assemblers/manufacturers.

# → KAM supports implementation of circular economy in Kenya



# **Engagement Details**


KAM, HAPROK, PAKPRO, and KEPRO collaborated with Community Based Organizations (CBOs) to implement Environmental Restoration Orders (EROs) issued by NEMA to manufacturers and producers.

These EROs require action from manufacturers and producers whose products are found in the environment, based on the "polluter pays" principle.

### **Outcome**

NEMA acknowledged the efforts of PROs and encouraged producers/manufacturers to offer incentives that attract waste collectors and recyclers to effectively manage their waste, aligning with the circular economy approach to post-consumer waste management.

# → KAM Cable sub-sector meeting on Finace Bill 2024



# **Engagement Details**

On 9th June 2024, the KAM Cable Subsector convened a meeting to discuss the implications of Finance Bill 2024, particularly the eco-levy on plastics packaging materials in chapter 39. Members were informed that the levy would not apply to raw materials. KAM proposed introducing the levy on imported finished packaging products entering the Kenyan market. Members emphasized the importance of implementing competitiveness measures in the industry to counter imports.

### **Outcome**

The Cable Sub-sector proposed an increase in excise duty for imported finished cables and conductors, citing sufficient local capacity. This measure aims to maintain competitiveness for local cable manufacturers in the domestic market.
